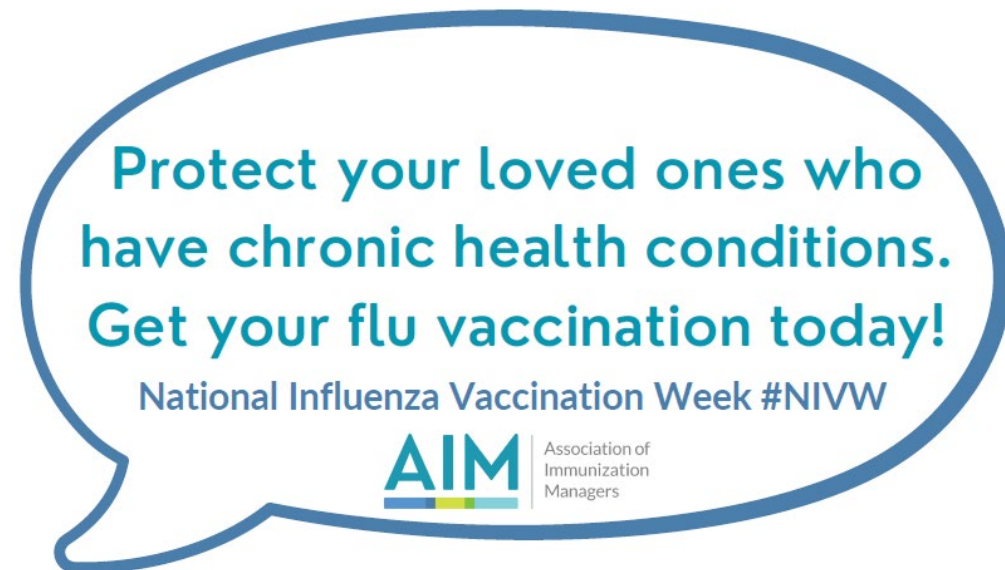

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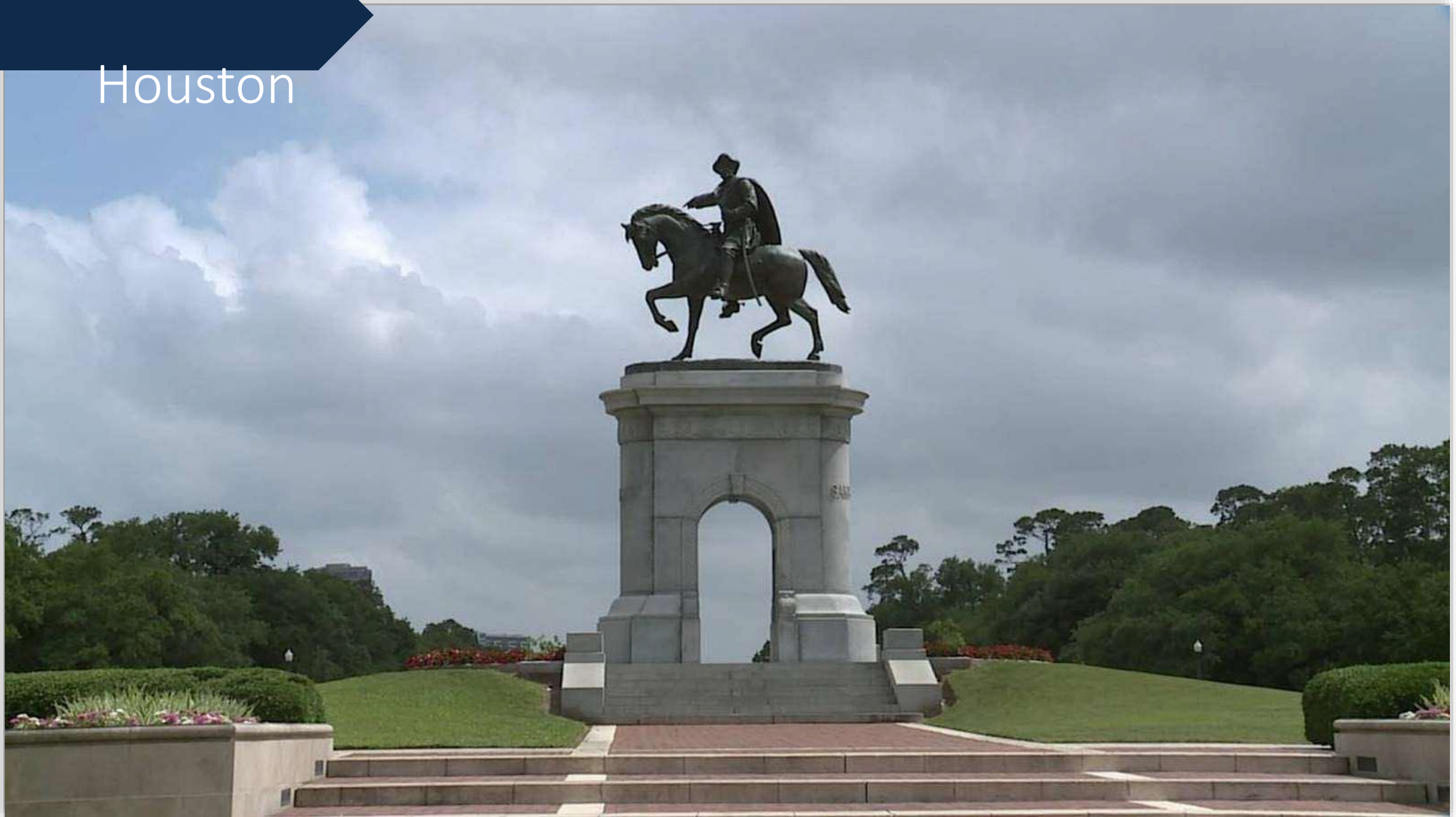

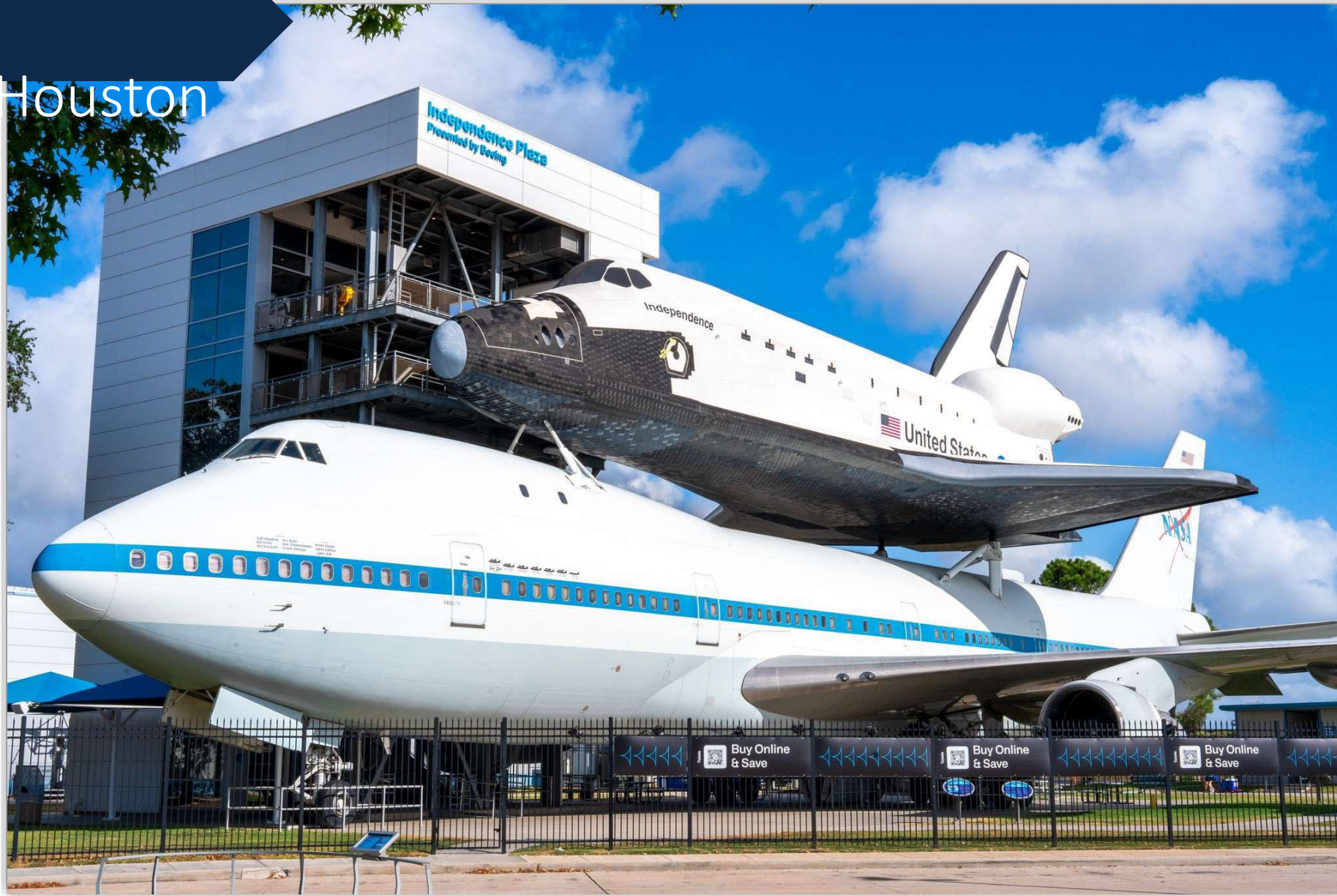

Texas Medical Center



Houston, Texas was founded in 1836 by Augustus Chapman Allen and John Kirby Allen. The city was named after Sam Houston, a hero of the Texas war for independence.

- 1836: The Allen brothers purchased 6,600 acres along the Buffalo Bayou for \$5,000.
- 1837: Houston served as the temporary capital of the Republic of Texas.
- 1826: The first settlement in the area, Harrisburg, was destroyed by the Mexican general Antonio López de Santa Anna.
- 1980s: Houston became the fourth most populated city in the United States.
- World War II: Shipbuilding and petrochemical industries came to Houston.

Houston is known as the "Energy Capital of the World" because of its oil and gas industry. The city is also home to many energy companies and academic institutions that focus on energy research.

Public Health in Houston

Early Healthcare Institutions:

- In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, Houston saw the establishment of early healthcare institutions, including hospitals and clinics, to meet the needs of the growing population.

Texas Medical Center (TMC):

- The Texas Medical Center, established in 1945, is one of the largest medical complexes in the world. It houses numerous hospitals, research institutions, and medical schools, contributing significantly to healthcare and biomedical research.

Natural Disasters and Public Health:

- Houston has faced challenges related to natural disasters, including hurricanes and flooding. These events have prompted public health responses to address issues such as waterborne diseases, emergency healthcare services, and community resilience.

Healthcare Infrastructure Expansion:

- Houston has witnessed continuous growth in its healthcare infrastructure, with the construction and expansion of hospitals, clinics, and research facilities to meet the needs of the expanding population.



- Houston is the most populated city in Texas and the fourth largest city in the United States.
- Houston has a diverse population with over 145 languages spoken.
- One in four residents are foreign born.
- Houston has many nicknames, including "Bayou City", "Space City", "H-Town", and "the 713".
- Houston is known for its connection to space exploration, sports teams, energy industry, museums, and cultural institutions.
- "Houston" was the first word heard from the moon.
- NRG Stadium was the world's first domed stadium.
- Houston is home to the first traditional Hindu temple in the nation.

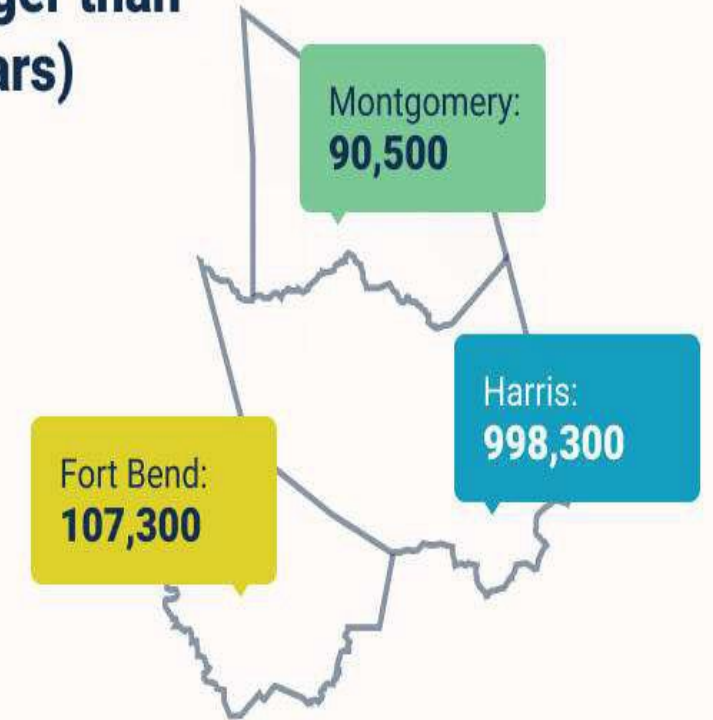


Talk Like a Houstonian

Impact of HHD Immunization Program

- The Houston Immunization Program saw a 4% (78.9% to 82.9%) increase from BY3 to BY4 in coverage of the 4:3:1:3:3:1:4 vaccination series among those 24-35 months of age at Houston Health Department WIC sites. The program is trending for another improvement this budget year as well.
- All providers (84/84) from BY4 selected for Immunization Quality Improvement for Providers (IQIP) Program initial visits received 2- and 6-month follow-ups. The success the Houston Immunization Program has had with the IQIP Program continues
- Currently have 464 TVFC/ASN Providers
- # of Clients HHD Served (between 10/01/2022 to 9/30/2023) among IZ Bureau, MVU, and 4 Health Centers
 - 9,271 children
 - 6,035 adults
 - 15,306 total clients

Protecting America's children every day

The Vaccines for Children (VFC) program helps ensure that all children have a better chance of getting their recommended vaccines. VFC has helped prevent disease and save lives.



CDC estimates that vaccination of children born between 1994 and 2021 will:

prevent **472 million** illnesses
(29.8 million hospitalizations)



more than the current population of the entire U.S.A.

help avoid **1,052,000** deaths



greater than the population of Seattle, WA

save nearly **\$2.2 trillion** in total societal costs
(that includes \$479 billion in direct costs)



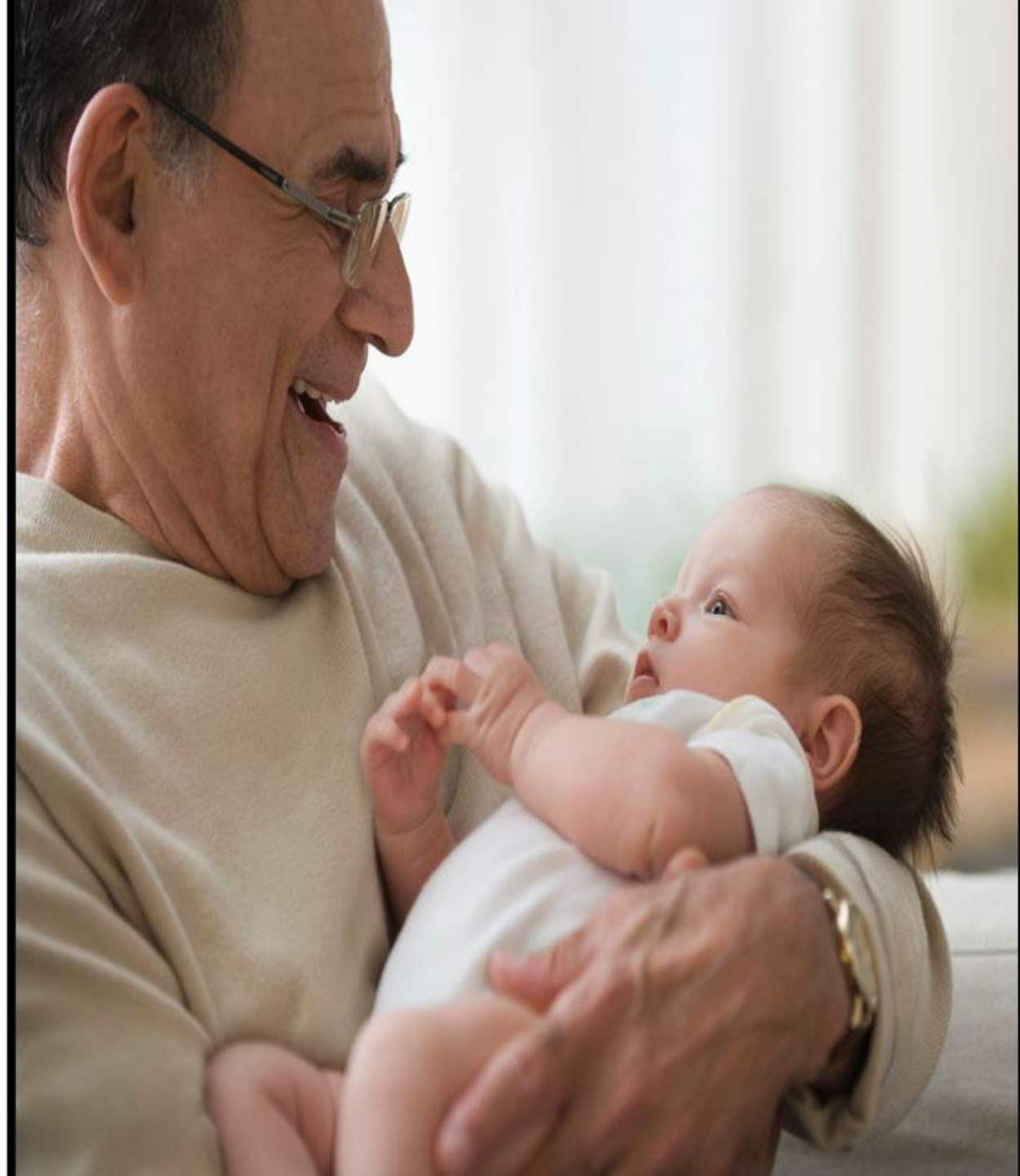

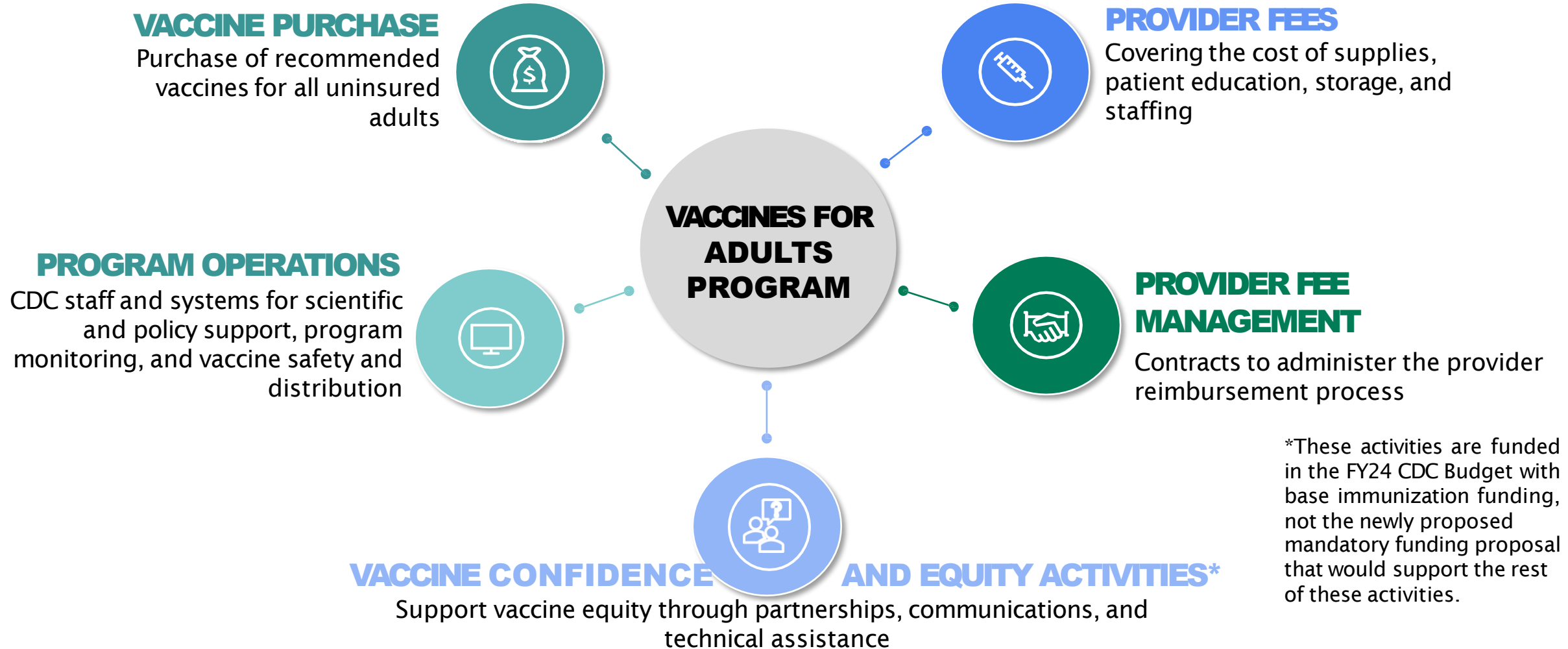

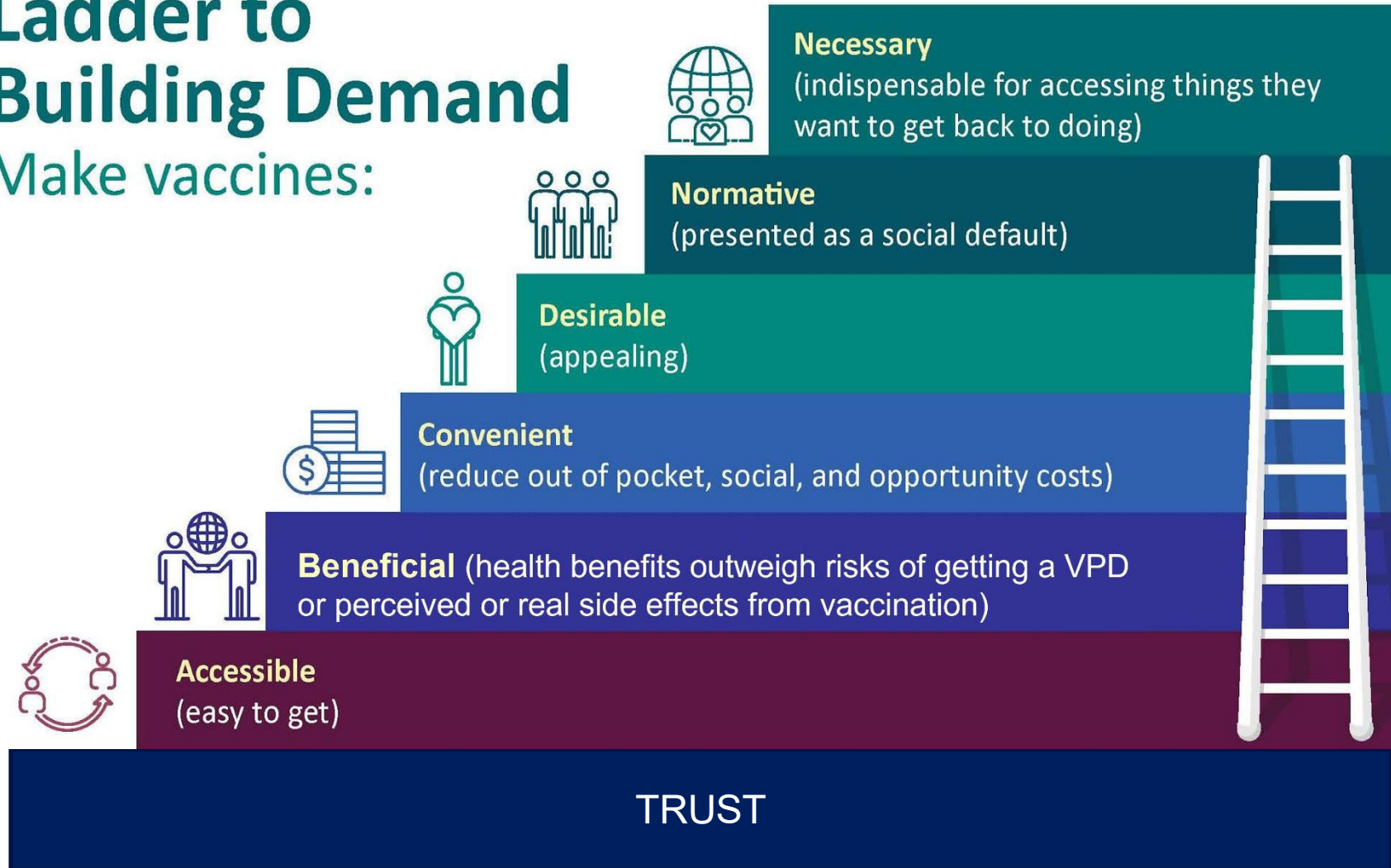
